A beautifully written food memoir chronicling one cook's journey from her rural Midwestern hometown to the intoxicating world of New York City fine dining and back again in search of her culinary roots.

Before Amy Thielen frantically plated rings of truffled potatoes in some of New York City s finest kitchens for chefs David Bouley, Daniel Boulud, and Jean-Georges Vongerichten she grew up in a northern Minnesota town home to the nation's largest French fry factory, the headwaters of the fast food nation, with a mother whose generous cooking pulsed with joy, family drama, and an overabundance of butter.

Inspired by her grandmother's tales of cooking on the family farm, Thielen moves with her artist husband to the rustic, off-the-grid cabin he built in the woods. There, standing at the stove three times a day, she finds the seed of a growing food obsession that leads to the sensory madhouse of New York's top haute cuisine brigades. When she goes home, she comes face to face with her past, and a curious truth: that beneath every foie gras sauce lies a rural foundation of potatoes and onions, and that taste memory is the most important ingredient of all.

Amy Thielen's coming-of-age account brims with energy, a cook's eye for intimate detail, and a dose of dry Midwestern humor. *Give a Girl a Knife* offers a fresh, vivid view into New York s high-end restaurant before returning Thielen to her roots, where she realizes that the marrow running through her bones is not demi-glace, but gravy honest, thick with nostalgia, and hard to resist."

Our speaker for the January 6 AAUW East Mesa Branch general meeting is **Rep.** Jennifer Jermaine, of LD18 in Chandler. In 2019 Representative Jermaine sponsored House Bill 2570, which was signed into law with broad bipartisan support, and she currently chairs the Committee Investigating Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls.

Jermaine and her family have lived in Legislative District 18 for 8 years. She has spent years in the nonprofit sector and helping people start and succeed in small businesses. She is the co-founder of Stronger Together and the We the People Summit, both of which empower individuals to strategize and collaborate to influence public policy.

As a Legislator her focus is on restoring education funding, providing equitable healthcare, protecting our civil rights, and honoring our shared values.

Representative Jermaine has a BA in International Business from San Diego State University and an MPA in Public Administration and Non-profit Administration from Arizona State University.

AAUW EAST MESA BRANCH SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE & MENTORS POSITION DESCRIPTIONS

I. Responsibilities of the Scholarship Committee Chair

A. Chair Meetings.

- 1. Scholarship Committee Meetings
- 2. Mentors' Meetings
- 3. "Scholar Mentor Coffee" in October ("Coffee" to be planned by the Mentors)
- B. Prepare the Agenda for the above Meetings.
- C. Provide leadership to the Scholarship Committee, Mentors and Scholarship Recipients.
- D. Act as a liaison between the Scholarship Committee and the AAUW of East Mesa Branch Officers.
- E. Communicate with Joy Klein, Scholarship Administrator for the Arizona Community Foundation.
- F. Communicate with the Scholarship Committee, Mentors and Scholars.
- G. Plan Mentors' Meetings with the Chair-elect.
 - 1. Early October Meeting for training and sharing of Ideas .
 - 2. Spring Meeting in March to discuss successes and issues encountered during the year.
- H. The Chair, Chair-elect and the Scholarship Committee will recruit from the AAUW of East Mesa Branch members to become Mentors for the Scholarship Program.
- I. The Chair position will be held for two-years beginning July 1(every other year).
- J. At the end of the two-year term, the Chair will serve on the Scholarship Committee as the Past Chair for one year or longer if requested by the new Chair.
- K. The position of Scholarship Committee Chair need NOT be filled by someone that is also a Mentor to one of the Scholarship Recipients. The Chair does not need to take on the responsibility of being a Mentor unless that is her choice.

II. Responsibilities of the Chair-elect

- A. Prepares to assume the position of the Scholarship Committee Chair.
- B. Recruited by the Scholarship Committee for a one-year term beginning July 1.
- C. Succeeds to the position of the Scholarship Committee Chair immediately following the year as Chair-elect.
- D. Assist the Scholarship Committee Chair in the execution of her duties and chair meetings in her absence.
- E. Act as the liaison between Maricopa Community Colleges and High School advisors and/or counselors in Apache Junction, Chandler, Gilbert and Mesa to increase the number of applicants for our scholarships.
- F. The position of Chair-elect need NOT be filled by someone that is also a Mentor to one of the Scholarship Recipients. The Chair-elect does not need to take on the responsibility of being a Mentor unless that is her choice.
