AAUW MEETING SPEAKER: FEBRUARY 3, 2021.



Janita Pickett Gordon, Executive Director Mesa Public Schools Foundation

Background—Twenty-eight years of education, public policy and philanthropy experience in foundations, nonprofits and academic institutions. Areas of special expertise include: major gift strategies with private foundations and individuals; engaging prospective donors in the investment of education, economic development, social justice and leadership development opportunities for women and girls through events/exclusive experiences; creating revenue streams to sustain nonprofit organizations; solicit and secure seven-figure naming gifts; establishing Level 5 Teams, planning and implementation of strategies to increase major gifts, building collaborative/community partnerships, monitoring and evaluating philanthropic strategies including individual solicitations, board development and training, marketing and communication strategies; Empowerment of youth through program design and evaluation.

Janita will share with us the work of the Mesa Public School Foundation in furthering the development of women, girls and minority groups. She will also focus on how our funds will further their work.

MENTORING

There are many individuals and organizations that award scholarships to worthy scholars, but there are only a few that mentor the students they select. AAUW East Mesa (AZ) Branch mentors the scholars they've selected to receive their scholarships. In the fall of 2018, I was asked to become a mentor and be on the Scholarship Committee. It didn't take me long to make the decision to say "Yes".

What is mentoring? "Mentoring is to support and encourage people to manage their own learning in order that they may maximize their potential, develop their skills, improve their performance and become the person they want to be", said Eric Parsloe of The Oxford School of Coaching and Mentoring. Mentoring is a brain to pick, an ear to listen and a push in the right direction. A mentor is someone who explores with the mentee their current career/education situation, provides support and advice (when asked), empowers them to reach their goals without prescribing solutions or recommending the education plan. A good mentor should have good listening skills and the qualities of being honest, trustworthy, supportive and always approachable.

In September of 2018, I met Maria, my mentee, for the first time. I was armed with questions to ask about her family, education goals and how she enjoyed spending her free time. Maria is a busy mom with two children, a part-time job and a husband that is supportive and helpful. She loves being at Mesa Community College and takes a leadership role in the activities available. As our relationship has developed over coffee, breakfast or lunch every two or three months and texting in between, we've become good friends. Sometimes I'm there just to be a good listener for her to throw out ideas of what to do for the next semester. Often just stating her ideas out loud is all she needs in order to plan. When asked for my opinion, I'm always cautious in my response. Most of the time I ask Maria questions to help her think through the situation. She tells me that she loves our meetings because I help her to sort through the available choices. Last week when we met for lunch, she gave me a gold bookmark with a butterfly attached. She explained that her dad always called her butterfly in Spanish. I was touched by her gift, but it was the card with the gift that filled my heart. The card read, "Thank you for taking me under your wing and caring about my growth and transformation. You are an inspiration and bright guiding light." As with most volunteering experiences, I receive as much from Maria as she does from me and perhaps even more. In my retirement, it's so nice to know that I can make a difference in someone's life by just being there for them, listening and asking a few good questions.
